What is site-based decision-making?



Site-Based Decision Making (SBDM)



Site-based decision making (SBMD) is a process for decentralizing decisions to improve the educational outcomes at every school campus through a collaborative effort by which principals, teachers, campus staff, district staff, parents, and community representatives assess educational outcomes of all students, determine goals and strategies, and ensure that strategies are implemented and adjusted to improve student achievement.

Ways to Get Involved

- Attending school-sponsored orientation events like Back to School Nights
- Volunteering at their student's school
- Participating in school fundraisers that supports student programming
- Becoming regular attendees at School Town Hall Webinars
- Joining a planning committee for school events
- Responding to surveys and other requests for information from the school
- Continuing to attend Padres Comprometidos sessions!



Why is it important to stay involved in your student's school?



Here are some great reasons.

Students whose parents are engaged with their schools are more likely to:

- Earn higher grades or test scores
- Graduate from high school and attend college or university
- Develop self-confidence and motivation in the classroom
- Possess better social skills
- Exhibit positive classroom behavior, requiring less redirection.



Challenges for Parents

- Economic barriers that require the parent to work multiple jobs
- Time limitations based on workload or scheduling conflicts
- A fear they lack the knowledge or skills to participate
- Perceived cultural differences between home and school
- General apathy towards students' educational needs



Lend your voice to pandemic-related decisions

- The role parents will play in deciding when students return to school
- The steps the school will take in ensuring student safety
- The mental health support schools will provide to students
- The steps schools will take to inform families of possible outbreaks
- The ways the school will counter stigma and bullying related to COVID-19



New York City Ranked Voting



Voting is one of the most important things we can do to create the world we want for our children and — bonus! — parents who involve kids in elections raise civic leaders!

What is Rank Choice Voting

- In a 2019 Ballot Measure New Yorkers elected to use Ranked Choice Voting
- Rank Choice Voting (RCV) allows voters to rank up to 5 candidates in order of preference, instead of choosing just one
- You can still vote for just one candidate if you prefer
- Here is a video which explains how RCV works
